And, we are so pleased to welcome Adam Nord as IJRC's International Advocacy Director.



From IJRC's satellite office in Johannesburg, South Africa, Adam is spearheading IJRC's efforts to guide and support grassroots organizations in their engagement with human rights monitoring bodies. In this role, Adam also produces practical and legal resources enabling grassroots actors to effectively access and use regional and international fora, and contributes to the overall advancement of IJRC's mission. Educational Video

In June, IJRC finished production of a 15minute <u>video</u> tutorial and <u>manual</u>, designed to educate advocates on the role and functions of the Inter-American Commission on Human Rights and Inter-American Court of Human Rights, two bodies responsible for protecting human rights throughout the Americas.

The video, Addressing Human Rights Violations in the Americas: Advocacy before the Inter-American System, is the **first of its kind** and we expect it will make a significant contribution to grassroots advocates' understanding of, and effective engagement with, this important regional mechanism.

The <u>video</u> and <u>manual</u> are **available** in **Spanish**, and we hope to obtain funding for French and Brazilian Portuguese versions, as well.



Boston Training

On May 18, IJRC hosted an all-day training on the international human rights framework for advocates and attorneys based in the United States, co-sponsored by Physicians for Human Rights and the American Civil Liberties Union of Massachusetts.

Michael Greco, Chair of the American Bar Association Center for Human Rights gave the <u>opening remarks</u> to the crowd of over 40 participants. Panelists included UN Human Rights Committee member <u>Gerald Neuman</u>, Professor <u>Martha Davis</u>, and attorney <u>Lisl</u> <u>Brunner</u>, among other experienced advocates.

We received **incredibly positive feedback** from the training participants, who included advocates working to:

The video's first four chapters provide an

animated explanation of the System and its components, the rights protected, how to present a complaint, and how complaints are processed. The fifth chapter features interviews with practitioners. See the <u>Video Guide</u> to follow along!
