REGIONAL HUMAN RIGHTS NEWS

The IJRC News Room covers significant developments at the regional human rights bodies. Recent stories are summarized below.

In the **Americas**, the Inter-American Court of Human Rights held its <u>107th regular session</u>, and issued <u>new</u> <u>judgments</u> addressing forced disappearances and the length of criminal proceedings. The Inter-American Commission on Human Rights issued a detailed report on murdered and missing <u>indigenous women in Canada</u>.

A number of human rights bodies responded to <u>killings</u> <u>by police in the United States</u>, and called for the investigation and <u>prosecution of torture</u>disclosed in a Senate report on the CIA's detention and interrogation program. In Guatemala, domestic courts convicted a former police chief for the 1980 <u>attack on the Spanish</u> <u>embassy</u> in Guatemala City, but <u>suspended the genocide</u> <u>trial</u> of former dictator José Efraín Ríos Montt.

In **Europe**, the European Court of Human Rights issued judgments concerning journalists' use of hidden cameras, the rights of adoptive parents in surrogacy arrangements, and the Netherlands' responsibility for a man's death at a military checkpoint in Iraq. The European Court of Justice rejected a draft agreement for the accession of the European Union to the European Convention on Human Rights.

In **Africa**, the African Court on Human and Peoples' Rights issued a judgment concerning Burkina Faso's <u>criminal defamation law</u> and a victim of



DEVELOPMENTS AT THE UNITED NATIONS

The United Nations human rights bodies have been engaged in various activities, including developing new standards and reviewing current State practices.

A UN Working Group advanced its development of a <u>Declaration on the Right to Peace</u>, and the landmark <u>Arms Trade Treaty</u> entered into force. At the <u>Lima Climate Change</u> Conference, some progress was made toward an agreement on climate change. In January, the UN also launched the <u>International Decade</u> <u>for People of African Descent</u>.

During its 28th regular session, the <u>UN Human Rights</u> <u>Council</u> considered a number of human rights issues, including racial discrimination, conflict situations, and the rights of children.

At the January session of the <u>Universal Periodic</u> <u>Review</u> Working Group, 14 States' overall human rights records were reviewed by their peers.

UN treaty bodies including the <u>Committee on Economic</u>, <u>Social and Cultural Rights</u>, <u>Committee on the Elimination</u> <u>of Discrimination against Women</u>, <u>Committee on</u> <u>Enforced Disappearances</u>, and the <u>Committee on the</u> <u>Rights of the Child</u> were in session to review States' human rights practices in these thematic areas. <u>extraordinary rendition</u> sought the African Commission on Human and Peoples' Rights' reconsideration of his complaint against Djibouti.

The Prosecutor of the International Criminal Court decided to <u>withdraw the charges against Uhuru</u> <u>Kenyatta</u>, the current President of Kenya, who was accused of having committed crimes against humanity.
