HUMAN RIGHTS SYMPOSIUM

IJRC was honored to co-sponsor the Colombia Law School Human Rights Institute's annual human rights symposium in June. This year, the Bringing Human Rights Home Lawyers' Network program focused on the topic of "Engaging with the Inter-American Human

Rights	System	for	U.S.	Advocacy."
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More than 100 people registered, and attendees learned from expert practitioners how, why, and with what challenges and results they might file complaints and engage in other forms of advocacy before the Inter-American Commission on Human Rights.

IJRC's executive director moderated the opening panel, which included representatives of civil society, the Inter-American Commission on Human Rights, and the U.S. Department of State.

DEVELOPMENTS AT THE UNITED NATIONS

The United Nations human rights bodies have been engaged in various activities, including developing new standards and reviewing current State practices.

The human rights treaty bodies compiled their <u>decisions</u> on <u>individual complaints</u> from fall 2014. This year's noteworthy decisions include the Committee on the Elimination of Racial Discrimination's opinion concerning <u>mandatory HIV/AIDS testing for foreigners</u> in Korea.

The UN human rights treaty bodies in session this spring and summer included the <u>Human Rights</u> Committee, Committee on Economic, Social and Cultural The IJRC News Room covers significant developments at the regional human rights bodies. Recent stories are summarized below.

In the Americas, governments elected new members to the Inter-American Court of Human Rights and Inter-American Commission on Human Rights. The Court published its 2014 annual report and held its 108th and 109th regular sessions. Among the cases recently referred to the Court is a complaint challenging anti-gay discrimination in Ecuador's military. The Commission's Special Rapporteur for Freedom of Expression released his report on freedom of expression in the Americas. And, in an important development for complainants, the Commission launched a new online portal allowing petitioners to information access about their cases.

In **Europe**, recent noteworthy judgments of the of Human Rights addressed European Court Italy's recognition of same-sex relationships, attacks against gay rights proponents and government corruption in Georgia, a young sexual abuse survivor's access to justice in Slovenia, freedom of assembly in Armenia, and access to gender reassignment surgery in Turkey. The European Committee of Social Rights reviewed six States' reports on the rights of children, families, and migrants and considered 16 collective complaints during its recent session.

In **Africa**, the African Commission on Human and Peoples' Rights issued its decision regarding the treatment of three <u>human rights defenders in</u> <u>Sudan</u>, adopted a resolution on <u>torture victims' right to</u> <u>rehabilitation</u>, and held a <u>session</u> that had twice been postponed due to the Ebola pandemic. The Central African Republic's legislature adopted legislation to create a new <u>Special Criminal Court</u> to prosecute war crimes and crimes against humanity.

<u>Rights, Committee against Torture, Committee on the</u> <u>Elimination of Racial Discrimination</u> and <u>Committee on</u> <u>the Rights of Persons with Disabilities</u>. The Human Rights Committee also met to begin developing a <u>general comment on the right to life</u>.

The Commission on the Status of Women also held its 59th session, during which it commemorated the <u>20th</u> <u>anniversary of the Beijing Declaration and Platform for</u> <u>Action</u>.

Fourteen States underwent examination during the most recent session of the <u>Universal Periodic Review</u>.

New standards include the <u>Mandela Rules</u>, revising the UN Standard Minimum Rules for the Treatment of Prisoners, and the Working Group on Arbitrary Detention's new guidelines on detainees and <u>prisoners'</u> <u>access to judicial review</u>.

The UN Human Rights Council created anew Special Rapporteur on the right to privacy, and the UN Special Rapporteur on freedom of expression examined online communication in his annual report. The Council also extended the mandates of its Commission of Inquiry and Special Rapporteur on the situation in Eritrea, and adopted a resolution concerning private education providers.
